




Make an Impact with a Qualified Charitable Distribution:

You can reap these rewards all while making a lasting impact on the lives of vulnerable babies in need. This donation method maximizes your charitable contribution because the full amount could go directly to ICS, without incurring taxes, and it simplifies your tax filing by eliminating the need to itemize deductions.

Her mother, Erin, is a former ICS board member who helped fundraise for the building where Addie volunteered and served as a teen volunteer. Addie's grandmother, Debra Marshall, was also an ICS board member, who assisted in creating the teen volunteer program.

Addie, an 8th-grader at Classen SAS, said that she was able to see how her work as a teen volunteer could directly affect others who were not as fortunate.

"I enjoy that feeling," she said.

Erin remembered similar emotions when she used to pack diapers at ICS. She felt like she was a part of something bigger.

"It's fun to see that she connected the dots," Erin said. Erin figured Addie had her sights set on volunteering at ICS. It still warmed her heart. Her daughter was indeed tapping into her family's longstanding outlook

During these uncertain times of furloughs, reductions in federal benefits, and rising costs, I sometimes worry that families don't know that Infant Crisis Services is here for anyone needing help with food, formula, and diapers for their baby.

People may think that they are not eligible for our services because of how much they make or because their financial struggles



are only temporary. But that's exactly when we can be a benefit. Infant Crisis Services specializes in helping families with children fill in the gaps while they stretch their budgets.

We have been following developments locally and nationally. In its update on SNAP benefits, Oklahoma Human Services asked Oklahomans to rally to support our neighbors. Because of your support, we are ready to answer that call by giving extra visits above the regular four per year. This is for all children aged younger than four and will continue through December 23. The change applies to all clients regardless of the number of times a family has visited us this year. Each baby or child will receive a week's worth of essential items free of charge. Extra visits can be made in-house and/or to the BabyMobile®.

ICS knows how dire the need is right now. Please, let your neighbors and others know that there is help to get lifesustaining necessities for their children. No baby should go hungry, even in uncertain times.



Over 45k Diapers Donated!

We are so excited to share that Infant Crisis Services received **45,011 diapers**, beating our goal of 41,000. With the help of our co-sponsors Children's Hospital of Oklahoma/OU Health and Quad Construction, we coordinated a week of activities starting September 15 and culminating on September 21 with a Community Drop-Off Day at ICS. Local businesses, organizations, families, and individuals stepped up to support babies and toddlers in our region:



- 1,598 packs of wipes donated
- \$734 earned from give back nights at local restaurants
- \$420 in monetary donations

We also thank the National Diaper Bank Network for spearheading the annual national campaign to raise awareness of diaper need in our country. And we applaud all who continue 👖 the fight to end diaper need.

One of the good things about doing the internship at ICS was the chance to see another nonprofit's approach, Kate said.

"I really enjoyed working with clients in the boutique, and learning about the development side," she said. "It has been a learning process."

Kate quickly fit into the development team. "She readily provided helpful insight on high school giving weeks, eagerly tackled prospect research for new rural donors, and acquired support from local businesses for Diaper Need Awareness Week and Bingo for Babies," said Lisa Perry, ICS senior development manager. "Her efforts this summer will help ICS raise even more funds this year to provide food, formula and diapers to babies."
